


Fiscal Year 2001 -






Average Daily Attendance

This is the percent of students that attend school each day.




Students Eligible for Free or Reduced Price Meals







Alabama Direct Assessment of Writing: Grade Five Percent of Students Meeting or Exceeding Standards




Alabama Direct Assessment of Writing: Grade Seven Percent of Students Meeting or Exceeding Standards
